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From the Principal

This week at Saint Mary's we celebrate 'Book Week'. It is a wonderful event that takes place across Australia each year to celebrate the joy of reading and the wonder of books.

Reading opens a world of possibilities to young people. Without the capacity to read and comprehend texts, children are limited in their capacity to engage with the curriculum as they move through their education and beyond. In order to learn, children must first learn to read. Reading for leisure is also one of the greatest pleasures in life. Learning to read, however, is a complex process and requires the combined support of classroom teachers, parents, carers and extended families. Children learn about the importance of reading as they watch family members use reading and writing for everyday purposes. Children see you reading and writing in everyday life – reading for pleasure, sharing a story with your child, using a recipe, making a shopping list, writing a birthday card or reading street signs. This teaches them that reading and writing are useful skills in today's world.

As we celebrate Book Week, I thought it would be timely to provide some valuable tips for helping with your child's reading; particularly those younger members of your family:

Firstly...

- Reading with your child at home will help your child in all learning areas of school.
- Listening to your child read at home is a good way of supporting your child's reading.
- Be confident that your child will learn to read.

What you can do at home to help

- Be yourself. Involve children in everyday conversations.
- Read aloud to children. It helps them to learn the language of books and will encourage them to enjoy books and reading.
- Talk about books, read together and make reading an enjoyable, shared activity.
- Make sure there is a wide range of reading material for your child at home, both fiction and non-fiction.
- It is important to read to your child in your home language if your first language is not English. Experience shows that using your home language will help your child to learn to read in English.
- Try not to let television intrude on reading time. Make a special time for reading with your child, away from interruption.
- Listen to your child every day, even for a short time.
- Give books as treats and presents.

Hints for listening to your child read

- Before reading, talk about the cover, the title, the pictures, and discuss what the book may be about.
- During reading, discuss what has been read up to that point, and imagine what will happen next time.
- After reading is finished, talk and ask questions about the story and the pictures.
- When reading a harder book together, take turns. Beginning readers can read the repetitive parts and more experienced readers can read a paragraph or a page.

When you come across an unknown word:

- pause to give your child time to work out the word
- prompt
- go back to the beginning of the sentence, or read past the difficult word to the end of the sentence.

- look for a clue in the picture or the words
- look at the first letter and think about what the words could be
- ask "Does this make sense?"
- try to sound out the word
- if necessary tell your child the word
- praise your child for trying even if mistakes are made.

Other things you can do to support your child's reading:

- Tell and re-tell stories of all kinds including favourite stories, fairy tales, movie plots, local news items and family history.
- Play games such as "I spy... something beginning with d".
- Ask your child to read out simple recipes while you cook together.
- Read comics, magazines, short stories, poems and rhymes, including nursery rhymes.
- Do crosswords & other word puzzles together.
- Read the TV guide before watching a program.
- Look at letterbox leaflets together.
- Read directions and signs when driving and shopping.
- Read and write notes and letters to family members.
- Play board games together and read the rules.
- Provide plastic letters, crayons, pencils, pens and writing paper.

And remember...

- Discuss the meaning of stories and words.
- Encourage your child to read anywhere and at any time.
- Let your child see you enjoy reading.
- Visit and use a library near you. Borrow books for yourself as well as your child.
- Talk to your child's classroom teacher or the principal for further help and advice.
- Enjoy reading it should be fun.

NAPLAN – The NAPLAN tests have been posted home on Friday 19.8.2016. If you have not received the document within 10 working days, please contact the office

On Monday this week Year 3 and Year 5 participated in a nationwide NAPLAN Online Linking Study reading test trial. The Pearson Assessment Services (Victoria) a national company is delivering this test in Queensland and across Australia at the same time. They also provided Invigilators for the NAPLAN reading trial. The class teacher was also with the class during the test. Our school was selected to participate in a paper reading test followed by an online reading test. These tests are a trial and as such there are no records kept. They are simply a trial to prepare for NAPLAN to be online in 2018. In order for this to happen there need to be many trials to link paper and online and to iron out the bugs – so to speak. It was only the year 3 and the straight year 5 cohorts at our college who participated in this trial. It will be interesting to find out how the trial went and what will need to be in place in order for all students in Years 3,5,7,9 across Australia, to complete NAPLAN Online in the coming years.

Book week and Wednesday's Book parade. This is always a big event for the calendar and for the students in Prep to Year 6. It was great to be part of the staff's rendition of Wombat Stew! 

Lectio Divina - 'the divine word'

Saint Benedict is often referred to as the father of Monasticism. He created a place for young men that was safe and provided a focus for their lives in a time when Europe was experiencing chaos. Benedict, a great theologian himself, established a rule for living in community based on the story and mission of Jesus. The college has adapted his rule to create our 5 B's, namely to be safe, respectful, responsible, just and to be ones best

One of Benedict's great legacies is a form of prayer attributed to his community called Lectio Divina, which simply means the 'divine word or reading'. The strength of this form of prayer is that the process reveals a deeper understanding of scripture and therefor of God.



Simply put, one chooses a short piece of scripture and then reads it four times, each time with a different purpose;

- 1. Read and Listen to familiarise, to settle down and with the text
- 2. Read and reflect to select a word or phrase that captures your attention and focus on that and why it may have resonated with you
- 3. Read and Respond articulate through prayer and possibly discussion what this means for you going forward
- 4. Rest in contemplation with the text and message

It sounds involved, formal and quite onerous, however having been part of it now I realise how freeing it is to have thoughts that are autonomous and not supressing the questions that arise from a close look at scripture.

Every Friday students and staff are offered the opportunity to take part in Lectio Divina, perhaps it is something you might want to try at home or encourage your student to ask about or try at school. Students learn about this ancient prayer in the Religious Education Curriculum in Year 7 and again in Year 10.

Year 7 to Year 10 Teaching and Learning News

With the end of term looming I would like to remind parents and students of the Assignment Extensions and Non-Submissions Process within our College's Year 7-12 Assessment Policy. This process has been explained to students by their teachers and will continue to be reinforced throughout the year.

- 1. All assignments are to be ready for submission at 8:45am on the due date. However, depending on the daily timetable, they may be collected at any time of the day. If students are planning to use college printing facilities, this must be done prior to the due date.
- 2. Where an extension is sought, it must be for valid reasons, and submitted to the Teaching and Learning Leaders (Mrs Angelique Arden Year 7-10 and Mr Wayne Dunbrack Year 11-12) at least three days before the due date. It must be submitted on the Assignment Extension Form which is available from Mrs Binding at Student Services. Only unforeseen circumstances will an application be approved if it is submitted less than 3 days before it is due.
- 3. Approved applications will be attached to the late submission.
- 4. If a student is absent on the due day, the assignment will be due to the subject teacher before home room on the day the student returns to the College. A note of absence must be attached to the late submitted work.
- 5. Failure to submit will result in teachers supervising the student in class to complete the assignment on the due date. Students will not be given overnight to complete the work.
- 6. When this action for non-submission has occurred, the teacher will contact the parent by phone or email to inform them that this process to ensure submission has been completed.
- 7. Teachers also inform the Teaching and Learning Leaders about non-submission and a record is kept.
- 8. Loss of student work due to computer malfunction is not a valid excuse for non-submission. It is the responsibility of the student to ensure that assignments are backed up to reliable alternative sources such as a USB or self-emailing a copy.
- 9. Where a student is absent doe to a planned school activity or excursion, and an assignment is due on that day, prior negotiation with the teacher is the responsibility of the student.

Ordering and Payment

We now have two options for ordering, online and the paper bag system. For Prep to Year 5 students it is recommended that you use either of these systems.

Online Ordering System QKR (Quicker): Your child's online order will be sent to the tuckshop, where it will be printed out. The orders are filled and placed in the class baskets. Their baskets are collected at morning tea and lunch. You are not required to send in a paper bag once you have ordered online.

Paper Bag System: Your child's order will be placed in the tuckshop baskets in their classroom in the mornings. The baskets are delivered to the tuckshop and orders are filled. Their baskets are collected at morning tea and lunch. Please do not use sticky tape or staples when using paper bags for ordering. It makes it difficult to get the bags undone without tearing. Plastic bags are not suitable for ordering, it is very difficult to place your child's order inside them. Bags can be purchased from the tuckshop for .05c each.

Year 6 to Year 12 students are more than welcome to use either system. If using the paper bag system, students place their bag orders at the tuckshop before school.

Do you know....

That you can now order online using QKR! QKR (Quicker) is an app that you can use on your phone, iPad or computer. If you would like assistance to use our online ordering system, call into the college office and see Briony Hoare or pop into the tuckshop and I will be able to assist you.
