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# From the Principal

How often today do we hear young people described as being 'wrapped in cotton-wool' to protect them from the world? Sadly, this all too common situation means that many young people lack the persistence necessary to keep going when things get tough and they give up at the very first hurdle. That is why teaching students to develop grit is important. The following extract comes from an article by Steve Francis MScM, BEd, DipT and discusses some useful tips for building resilience in young people.

**What is grit?** According to Angela Duckworth, Associate Professor of Psychology at University of Pennsylvania, "Grit is a disposition to pursue very long-term goals with passion and perseverance." The research on grit is compelling. Students with high levels of grit are more successful. However according to Duckworth, grit is as much a personality trait as it is a learned behaviour. For some students developing grit is easier than for others.

Teaching grit fits well with Dr Carol Dweck's concept of encouraging a *growth* mindset instead of a *fixed* mindset. According to Duckworth and Dweck real success does not necessarily correlate with intellectual ability. It requires hard work, determination, and self-control – so-called non-cognitive traits that enable students to reach their full potential. Real growth happens when students work at the edge of their competence. Students who are not challenged lose out on the sense of confidence that comes from mastering a challenge and they may come to believe that accomplishment should be effortless.

However, it is important to get the balance right between struggle and frustration. Overcoming barriers can quickly turn to frustration if the student doesn't have the prerequisite skills, the learning leap is too far or they don't make the connection between their prior learning and the new learning situation they are facing. It takes time, persistence and some experimenting to plan rich learning opportunities that challenge but don't frustrate students.

We can help students develop grit and a growth mindset by ....

**Praising the behaviour you want to see** – recognise when students are struggling and praise their persistence. Instead of praising intelligence and saying "You are so smart", praise the behaviour you want to see, "You tried really hard on that!" or "You didn't give up even when it was hard!"

Not accepting "I don't know" as an answer. Encourage young people to have a go and take a risk.

Letting students know that learning involves struggle - Too many students equate struggle with stupidity; they think that feeling confused or overwhelmed during a lesson means that it's too difficult. However, confusion and struggle are a natural and necessary part of true learning, and learning to accept struggle as part of the process can help students stick with lessons when the going gets tough.

**Encouraging self-awareness** – help students to become aware of their self-talk (that little voice inside our heads). The first step in replacing thought patterns or self-talk that are not helping us is to become aware of them. Self-awareness is an important component of emotional intelligence.

**Providing and promoting alternative language** to support students when they feel challenged. Instead of saying "It's too hard!" – try replacing it with "This is a tough one but I'm determined it won't beat me!" OR "This might take work but it's worth it!"

### realise your dignity

Instead of allowing young people to give up by saying "I'm not good at this" – encourage them to try adding "Yet!" to their statement so it becomes "I'm not good at this ... yet!"

#### <u>Welcome</u>

We welcome Tracy Robinson on board as the Year 5 teacher for the rest of Term 4. This will provide more stability in the Year 5 classroom as we head towards the end of 2016. We keep Mrs Katie Mangan in our prayers, for a full recovery back to good health.

#### <u>Swimming</u>

Thank you to the parents who are sending in the forms to help out with the water familiarisation sessions in Week 5 and Week 6. Please complete the yellow form if you are intending to help out. This can be returned to the office. Also, please remember to circle which time you will be able to help at the pool. Thank you for supporting our students. Please remember the swim caps. Students are not permitted in the water without a swim cap (Brisbane Catholic Education BCE mandate).

The program is different this year as we move from swimming lessons to water familiarisation and water safety for students Prep to Year 6. With the hot weather fast approaching the covered pool of the Nanango aquatic centre will be much appreciated. This is also of great benefit if the weather changes and we have wet weather.

Swimming lessons have been a big part of Saint Mary's primary sport over the past 10 years or so. In the past, when our numbers were small, and the health and safety regulations were not as strict as they are today, teachers were taking their own classes for swimming lessons, getting in the water etc. More recently, we have had Mrs Jenny Lutz an experienced and qualified swim coach, employed at Saint Mary's as a school officer, prepare lessons and teach swimming to the children P-6.

However, Mrs Lutz is no longer able to provide the services of a swim coach over that extended period of time (all day, every day for ten days) to 250 students. Increased numbers, more mandated regulations of WHS and BCE have meant if swimming is taught, then the services of a qualified swim coach need to be employed. Swim coaches cost between \$35 and \$45 per hour. As you can imagine the costs sky rocket to pay a swim coach to teach swimming to 250 children all day, every day over eight to ten days.

Ultimately, though, we are directed by and begin with the school curriculum documents. It is not mandated that swimming strokes be taught to students Prep to Year 6. With more concepts having to be taught across the 9 key learning areas it is not required (or cost effective) to offer swimming lessons daily for 8 days or weekly for eight weeks.

If there is a specific swimming lesson as part of a specific PE unit, (relating more to secondary) the PE teacher, if a qualified swim coach, can direct that specific lesson.

There will be a **Parent Volunteer Session** with Mr Turnbull on **Wednesday**, **19<sup>th</sup> October from 9am** in the College Boardroom. Parents need to have completed this session to be able to volunteer at the College.

#### Prep to Year 6 Assemblies

Our P-6 assemblies are now in the bottom courtyard on Fridays. This now **starts at 2.25pm**. The final school bell goes at 2.55pm. Children will bring their bags down to assembly and leave from the courtyard.

Enjoy the final 8 weeks of this term and then like Mr. Finnegan we 'begin again' in 2017. It's a very busy term culminating in our Christmas Concert on the Thursday evening of the last week of school.

Adore for 24 Dear Parents,



From Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> to midday Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> of October the School will lead the students in Eucharistic adoration over a period of 24 hours. Each class will have half hour sessions which in which there will be scriptural meditations, reflection times and silent prayer. Adore 24 will take place at Saint Mary's Church on Albert Street and the students will walk down under the supervision of their class teacher.

Adoration is an ancient Catholic tradition that continues to this day. It is a time where the Blessed Sacrament (the host) that is consecrated at the Mass is exposed in a monstrance and placed on the altar. It is a chance to be still before our Lord. This links in with St Benedict's invitation to "listen with the ears of our heart" to the voice of our Lord. St John Paul II prayed for an increase in the devotion when he asked priests, religious and lay people "to continue and redouble their efforts to teach the younger generations" the meaning and value of Eucharistic adoration. Brisbane Catholic Education's RE curriculum document says: a true test of a school's authenticity or authentic identity and culture is to the extent which the Church is present at the school and the school is present at the church.

#### Ordering and Payment

We now have two options for ordering: online and the paper bag system. For Prep to Year 5 students it is recommended that you use either of these systems.

**Online Ordering System QKR (Quicker):** Your child's online order will be sent to the tuckshop where it will be printed out. The orders are filled and placed in the class baskets. Their baskets are collected at morning tea and lunch. You are not required to send in a paper bag once you have ordered online.

**Paper Bag System:** Your child's order will be placed in the tuckshop baskets in their classroom in the mornings. The baskets are delivered to the tuckshop and orders are filled. Their baskets are collected at morning tea and lunch. <u>Please do not use sticky</u> tape or staples when using paper bags for ordering. It makes it difficult to get the bags undone without tearing. <u>Plastic bags are not suitable for ordering</u> as it is very difficult to place your child's order inside them. Bags can be purchased from the tuckshop for .05c each.

Year 6 to Year 12 students are more than welcome to use either system. If using the paper bag system, students place their bag orders at the tuckshop before school.

That you can now order online using QKR! QKR (Quicker) is an app that you can use on your phone, iPad or computer. If you would like assistance to use our online ordering system, call into the College office and see Briony Hoare or pop into the tuckshop and I will be able to assist you.
