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### *From the Principal*

#### Celebrating Success

I would like to congratulate two groups of Saint Mary's students who have recently achieved notable results in external competitions.

Mr Connolly and his Senior Chemistry students were recently awarded first place in the South-East Queensland Regional Titration Competition and have now been invited to compete in the National Finals in September.

Our Saint Mary's debating team, (Caitlin Lang, Elizabeth Watson and Josee Currin), won the final of the South Burnett APEX Debating Competition last week with an impressive presentation of the affirmative position that *Australia should become a republic*. They will now compete in the Wide Bay round against a Fraser Coast team.

### **Screen Time and Children**

The following article is written by Mrs Anna Neynens, a counsellor at the College and provides some very useful advice around screen time for our students.

Technology is becoming more and more a part of our world. Everyone I know has a mobile phone, computer or iPad and most families have multiple of these kinds of devices. Throughout history, this technological abundance is a place that we as the human race, as a school, and as families have never been before and although research into technology and children has come in an abundant flurry of articles in recent years, it's still something that most families really struggle with. So let's have a look at what's out there and what the experts have to say about video games, screen time and your child.

*realise your dignity*

In 2009 a study was done on 1100 young people who played video games. 20% of these fit the criteria as having an addiction and they had:

- more trouble paying attention in school
- poorer grades, and
- more health problems

However, even young people who didn't fit the criteria as having an addiction also had problems. Studies have shown that those who play video games spend less time doing homework, performed worse in school tests (in reading and writing), and their teachers were more likely to report academic problems.

Anyone who has played video games would be aware of how engaging they are and how easy it is to lose track of time when gaming. It is the same for young people, but it is not realistic to expect children and teenagers to have the self-control needed to know when to stop. As parents and guardians, it is our duty to monitor kids gaming and screen time.

### ***What do parents and families need to do to help their children have a healthy relationship with technology?***

The latest guidelines suggest that:

- children under 18 months should avoid screen time, other than video-chatting
- children aged 18 months to two years can watch or use high-quality programs or apps if adults watch or play with them to help them understand what they're seeing
- children aged two - five years should have no more than one hour a day of screen time with adults watching or playing with them.
- children aged six years and older should have consistent limits on the time they spend on electronic media and the types of media they use.

**Set strict time limits** on when screen time is and when it is not (and make sure you stick to those limits yourself).

**Monitor what your child is using.** Parental control settings shouldn't replace real-life monitoring. Peer over their shoulder and engage in the game with them – talk about it, ask questions and participate in the game or program together. When shopping for games, choose games that are non-violent and promote thinking or activity, such as electronic board games, puzzles or sports games.

**Have electronic curfews** - Have regular routines that limit the amount of time spent on devices. Figure out what will work best for your family. Some families with teenagers have to put all phones and tablets into a basket at 8pm each night and they aren't allowed to look at them until after breakfast the next morning. Other families have no electronics after dinner, whilst others have an electronics free day once a week or month.

**Have real life FaceTime** – Don't replace conversation and quality time together with Twitter, 'Buzz - feeds' and Nintendo. Children need to spend uninterrupted time talking and playing with adults to learn crucial social skills, protocols and speech and language skills. Try to take time to talk and play with, and read to your child, screen-free, everyday.

As Shawn Bean from Parenting.com writes, *"We are right smack in the middle of The Transition, our collective shift from analog to digital. (See: Hulu; mp3; Kindle, Amazon.) But there is a fundamental difference between the two. It's the difference between thinking and thoughtful. We are hugs, not likes. We are conversations, not status updates. We require growing up, not software updates. Let's make sure to strike the right balance, and take the best parts of the analog world with us."*

Have a fun, rejuvenating holiday – and make sure you spend some time 'real-life FaceTiming'!

## *Athletics Carnival News*

A reminder to all students that hats are a part of your uniform. At the coming Athletics Carnival if you do not have a hat you will be seated in the shade all day and not allowed to participate in any events.

### **Student Expectations – Athletics Carnival**

- In fairness for all students, parents are not to bring take away food into the College for their child.
- The College tuckshop will be open for both days
- Please see the attached timetable for where students are to assemble morning and afternoon homeroom of each day
- Students may wear only their house colours or College sport uniform to school in appropriate attire for participation.
- Students in Prep – Year 6, please have written the age you are turning (or have turned) **THIS year** and the first letter of your College house (Polding, Quinn or Rush). Primary teachers will assist with this in the morning of the carnival for those students who do not have it written already.
- Any student departing early is to follow the normal process i.e. permission from their supervising teacher and go via the College office to be signed out.
- Any unsafe or behaviour that is not following the College expectations will result in leadership deciding if a forfeit of house points or possible disqualification from an event is necessary. This is both during events and also when you are having a break or time to spectate.
- All 10-17+ years students are to remain on the top oval during class time on the day. Use the Mary Knoll Centre toilets if needed. You must have permission from your supervising teacher to leave the top oval for any reason.
- Students are permitted to leave the top oval for their regular morning tea and lunch break.
- For 10-17+ years when you are not timetabled to be completing an event you must remain with your age group all day and may spectate or at the discretion and direct supervision of the supervising teacher may compete in games on the lower oval.
- No balls are to be brought onto the top oval. This is necessary for the safe running of the carnival.
- 10-17+ year students need to take their bags with them from event to event. As you will be constantly on the move during the carnival, shade will be limited and you must have a hat and sunscreen.
- It is the students responsibility to be present and on time for events in which they are participating.
- No electronic devices.


## *Grin and Tonic Performance*

Toowoomba teenager Kristjan Terauds is two weeks short of his nineteenth birthday and attended a festival, little did he know he would die due to complications from illicit drug use. From the words of Kristjan's family and friends interviewed over several months and the journal of Kristjan's father, 'a powerful story and performance involving love, loss, and sadness, with touching humour'.

All students watching were engaged in this dramatic performance. The two talented actors, Nathan and Brooke each played 13

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characters and used simple props to quickly change their identity, for example; wearing a hat or holding a handbag. This Verbatim theatre performance was thoroughly interactive and you could connect to each character on an emotional level. Verbatim theatre is using the exact same words which were used originally. The performance reflected each character's personality and emotion throughout this difficult time.

Kristjan himself was echoed as loving, warm, generous, open, honourable, gentle, complex and provocative.

# *South Burnett School Sport (10-19yrs) Code of Conduct*

## **Students' Code of Behaviour**

- Take responsibility for your own behaviour and performance.
- Compete by the competition conditions and rules.
- Never argue with the Judge's, Referee's or Umpire's decision.
- Control your temper – no criticism by word or gesture.
- Work equally hard for yourself and your team – your team's performance will benefit and so will your own.
- Be a good sport. Encourage and support your own team members.
- Show respect for yourself, your team mates, officials, your opponents and their skills.
- Behave in a manner that respects the rights of others.
- Smoking, drinking of alcoholic beverages, use of any illegal substances and substance abuse is strictly forbidden.
- Entering or remaining upon restricted licensed premises under the supervision of the team officials or billeting parents is strictly forbidden.
- Going to bed at a reasonable hour will assist your own and your team's performance.
- Wear the official team uniform at all times, as directed by team management / officials.
- Check-in and check-out with team management/officials each day.
- Stay in the designated team area and support other team members during times when you are not competing.
- Follow all directions of team management/officials.

## **Consequences for student breaches of this code**

Team managers may deal immediately with any breaches of this code by imposing appropriate consequences, including not playing remaining fixtures, notification of parents and being sent home at your parents' cost. The District Committee / Regional School Sport Board (RSSB) is responsible for imposing longer term consequences such as a suspension from representative sport for up to two years.

Furthermore, the District Committee / RSSB may provide a report to your school and you may be subject to discipline in accordance with the Education (General Provisions) Act 2006 (EGPA).

Students will be afforded natural justice in respect of breaches of this code and for any discipline under the EGPA.

## **Parents' Code of Behaviour**

- Cooperate with the school to achieve the best outcomes for your child.
- Support team and event officials in maintaining a safe and respectful; learning environment for all students.
- Maintain positive relationships with team officials regarding your child's learning, wellbeing and behaviour.
- Encourage participation by your children.
- Provide a model of good sportsmanship for your child to copy.
- Be courteous and constructive in your communication with players, team officials and sport administrators.
- Encourage honest effort, skilled performance and team loyalty.
- Make any new parents feel welcome on all occasions.
- Do not interfere with the conduct of any events.
- Support School Sport Australia's policy of smoke and alcohol free environment.

## **Spectators' Code of Behaviour**

- Demonstrate appropriate social behaviour.
- Remember children play for enjoyment, don't let your behaviour detract from their enjoyment.
- Let game officials conduct events without interference.
- Support skilled performance and team play with generous applause.
- Demonstrate respect for opposing players and their supporters.
- Support School Sport Australia's policy of smoke and alcohol free environment.

## **Consequences for parent/spectator breaches of this code**

Team managers and event organisers may deal immediately with any breaches of this code by warning offender about their conduct, asking offenders to leave venues, and calling police to intervene where necessary. The District Committee / Regional School Sport Board is responsible for imposing longer term consequences such as written warning, or barring attendance at future events for a period or indefinitely.

Parents and spectators will be afforded natural justice in respect of breaches of this code.

Parents and spectators should also note that where fixtures are held on State School premises, the offence provisions under the Education (General Provisions) Act 2006 (EGPA) apply and offenders' actions may be referred to police for action.
