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From the Principal

At St Mary's Catholic Parish last Sunday, we were blessed to hear from a spokesperson from **Catholic Mission**. Founded in 1822, today Catholic Mission is the Pope's own mission organisation which acts both locally and globally to building communities of disciples who proclaim the gospel, serve people in need, act for justice, and adopt child-focused development programs. Catholic Mission operates in over 160 countries, including remote parts of Australia. Grassroots needs are identified by local Catholics, to give people the opportunity for a full, enriched life, both physically and spiritually, regardless of race, stigma, religion or gender. This year for World Mission Day 2017 Pope Francis said:

"Young people are the hope of mission.... They seek ways to put themselves with courage and enthusiasm at the service of humanity."

Socktober is an initiative of Catholic Mission. Next week, students at Saint Mary's will be encouraged to participate in Socktober to raise awareness about issues of justice and poverty around the world. The 'sock it to something' concept is an Australian expression that means to strike out at. We want to invite our young people to help us strike out at social issues, such as poverty, child labour, child trafficking, homelessness and lack of education and to also find ways to provide practical support.

Indigenous Graduation

On Friday I had the pleasure of accompany our four Year 12 Indigenous students, Mrs Myles, Nikki Law and Mr Turnbull to the annual Year 12 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Graduation Liturgy and presentation held at the Cathedral of St Stephen in Brisbane. The theme of the liturgy was 'Success is a Journey not a Destination' and the speakers - a Year 12 student, a parent of a graduating student and Ms Betts (Executive Director of Brisbane Catholic Education) all expounded on this theme.

The message was consistent from all speakers in the advice given to these young people as they leave school and move onto the next chapter- whether it be further education or work or a gap year. The messages when summarised were 'Dare and Do', 'Be the Best You Can Be' and 'Don't Be a Slack Lot' – these last were the words of a father of one of the boys graduating who encouraged the students to go out and have courage and aspire to greater things.

Saint Mary's was represented well in the staff area too as both Mrs Myles and Nikki Law were invited to read and it was a very proud moment for the staff present as Miranda Blackman, Trent Hill, Vincent McGregor and Tahlea Tapau were presented with their graduation certificates by Ms Pam Betts, Uncle Eric Law and Mr Paul Thornton (Director BCE – School Services – North). Congratulations to Miranda, Tahlia, Trent and Vincent on their wonderful achievement.



Awards Night

Stress

At this time of the year, students particularly in Years 11 and 12 feel stressed and sometimes overwhelmed by the amount of assignments and exams that may be approaching.

I read the following in the newspaper (Courier Mail) on Saturday and thought that the advice was well worth printing in our newsletter

If your child is stressed, giving them a sense of perspective helps. Yes the exams are important and they should do their best, but you can ease the pressure on your teen, by reassuring them that they must do their best and you'll always support them no matter what happens and even if things don't go to plan, they have a lifetime ahead of them to work it out.

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It may help to look at programs aimed at coping with stress, providing study skills and building resilience (and we do do this at school and students will have had lessons in these areas across their secondary years of schooling). There are various relaxation apps that can help and exercise is important at times of high stress as well. Going to be at a reasonable time, eating healthy meals and taking systematic breaks can be of benefit too. It's important to ensure that your child does the things they love as well, whether it be going for a walk, being part of a sporting team, listening to music, playing a musical instrument, or watching their favourite show. Organisations such as Beyond Blue and Kids Helpline have information and tips on their respective websites for surviving Year 12.

QCAA - New Senior Schooling

This week, Mrs Myles and I are attending the QCAA conference in Brisbane. We are expecting to hear more about the implementation of the new senior schooling system, which will begin in 2019.

Our current Year 9 students will be the first students to graduate under the new system in 2020. Last week Wayne Chapman (Senior Education Officer) from BCE presented to the secondary staff about the new system. The College has, over the past few months, sent numerous staff to professional development, so that all staff are upskilled on the new system. We will continue to do this over the next 12 months as well, which will mean we are well-positioned to make the transition for our students as seamless as possible.

The new system is quite different from the current system. There will be exams at the end of Year 12 for all general subjects. In Maths and Science, these exams will count for 50% of the students final Year 12 result but in all other subjects the exam will count for 25%. These exams will be set and marked by the QCAA. During the course of the students' final 2 units of work, they will complete 3 internal assessments that will make up 50% of their final grade (Maths and Sciences) and 75% for the other subjects. There will be no longer be a QCS Test. Students completing their schooling in 2019 (our current Year 10 students) will sit the final QCS Test.

Early next year, we will invite parents to an Information evening to explain the new system. I will continue to inform parents regarding this new system over the next few weeks.


